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A: HECTOR PIETERSE MUSEUM

On 16 July 1976, photographer Sam Nzima captured an iconic image of the Soweto Uprising – of the dying 12-year-old Hector Pieterse being carried by a fellow student. He was killed when the police opened fire on students protesting against the imposition of Afrikaans as a medium of instruction. This photograph, alongside other black-and-white images, is on display at the Hector Pieterse Museum in Soweto. Together with banners used by protesting students during the uprising, and oral testimonies, the exhibition honours the youth and their contribution to liberation in South Africa.

The three-storey, red-brick and galvanised-steel building allows views that establish connections between significant sites across Soweto's landscape.

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B: LILIESLEAF FARM

The raid on Liliesleaf, the ANC's Rivonia headquarters, on 11 July 1963, led to the Rivonia Trial that sentenced, among others, Nelson Mandela, Denis Goldberg, Govan Mbeki and Walter Sisulu to life imprisonment.

The Security Police raid was the result of a tip off that Walter Sisulu was in hiding at Liliesleaf, and resulted in the stalling of the momentum of the liberation struggle. As Liliesleaf stands today, recently opened as a museum with 60 percent of the original brickwork, it pays tribute to a significant aspect of South African history, conveying this information in an interactive manner that brings these stories to life by recreating the living and working environment at the time of the raid.
